To our St. Anthony-New Brighton School District residents,



Thank you for your continued support of our District. It is an exciting time in ISD 282! One month has passed in our new school year and we are well into positive teaching and learning, events and activities.

We are thankful to be a part of a school community that recognized, and supported, necessary changes throughout our District. Phase I of the construction projects is essentially complete and we have started planning for Phase II, which will take place next summer. Our staff and students are experiencing significant changes in the way they can now deliver and receive instruction. We continue to be very grateful for community support of these renovations. They have given new life and enthusiasm to our staff and students.

In fact, I would like to personally invite you to tour the newly renovated classrooms and updated spaces. **We have scheduled a tour for residents on October 21st at 6:30 p.m.** We have also scheduled tours specifically for senior citizens (see page 8). It is our plan to personalize the tours so people can have plenty of opportunity to ask questions and get information on the buildings. Please call Community Services (612-706-1166) to make a reservation.

People are amazed when they see the changes and improvements in our renovated buildings. In the spirit of a Top Ten List, I want to share with you a synopsis of the work that was completed this past summer and a projection of work that will be done next summer.

Summer 2009 Top Ten List: PHASE I

1) Site Safety Improvements at Middle/High School Building

Significant improvements were completed to separate parent/student drop off and the creation of a dedicated bus loop. When dropping off students, parents now avoid the congestion on 33rd Avenue with the new horseshoe loop.

2) Wilshire Park STEM Computer Lab Addition

A new state-of-the-art STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, & Mathematics) computer lab was constructed at Wilshire Park. This new STEM lab will provide enhanced curricular and learning opportunities for students as well as fulfill the need for additional testing capabilities at our Elementary school.

3) District-wide Bathroom Renovations and ADA Improvements

Bathroom renovations and ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) improvements were completed throughout the District including replacement of finishes, new piping systems, plumbing fixtures, and associated accessories.

4) District-wide Ventilation and Indoor Air Quality Improvements

Extensive indoor air quality improvement projects were completed and included renovation and replacement of District HVAC systems to comply with current ventilation standards and improve overall comfort within the facilities.

5) Science Lab Renovations at Middle/High School Building

The existing science laboratory and lecture spaces underwent extensive renovation and updates. The improvements resulted in significantly enhanced programmatic opportunities and state-of-the-art learning environments for all students. Our students will be able to compete locally, nationally, and internationally with these new facilities.

6) Special Education Space Renovations at Middle/High School Building

Special education spaces were renovated and reconfigured to appropriately meet the current and future needs of the program.

7) Computer Lab Renovations at Middle/High School Building

Computer labs were renovated and expanded to better accommodate the current and future needs of students and staff. In addition, the new labs will help administer state and national curricular and assessment requirements for our students.

8) District-wide Security Enhancements

Security enhancements were completed and improvements include installation of video surveillance systems and controlled card access systems at both Wilshire Park and the middle/high school building.

9) Audio / Video / Technology Updates

In conjunction with the District-wide renovation and deferred maintenance work, significant improvements were completed related to the audio and video systems, and associated technology infrastructure in both facilities to enhance programmatic capabilities for students at all grade levels.

10) District-Wide Deferred Maintenance (paint, doors, casework, flooring, etc.)

In addition to all of the renovation work that was completed throughout the District, deferred maintenance work was completed at both facilities including door and hardware replacement, painting, flooring replacement, cabinetry replacements and upgrades.

Summer 2010: PHASE II (Projections)

1) District-wide Bathroom Renovations and ADA Improvements

Bathroom renovations and improvements will continue in areas of the secondary building that were not completed during Phase I. Improvements will include replacement of finishes, new piping systems, plumbing fixtures, and associated accessories.

2) District-wide Ventilation and Indoor Air Quality Improvements

Indoor air quality improvement projects will continue in areas of the secondary building that were not completed during Phase I. The projects will include renovation and replacement of District HVAC systems to comply with current ventilation standards and improve overall comfort within the spaces.

3) District-Wide Deferred Maintenance (paint, doors, casework, flooring, etc.)

Deferred maintenance work that was not completed during Phase I will continue at both facilities and include door and hardware replacement, painting, flooring and tile replacement, cabinetry replacements and upgrades.

4) Food Service / Kitchen Renovation & Expansion at Middle/High School Building

The kitchen and food service facilities are scheduled to be renovated and expanded during Phase II. The new spaces will be designed and constructed to meet current State guidelines and will be more appropriately sized for the student population.

5) Elevator Addition & Associated Accessibility Improvements at Middle/High School Building

As an integral part of the District plan to improve overall site safety and accessibility, an elevator will be added at the secondary building. This improvement will enable improved access to multiple levels of the building for students, staff, and visitors.

I want to express gratitude for the wonderful opportunities our students and their families bring into our District. Our combined school population, made up of resident and open-enrolled students, formulates the funds needed to provide all of the wonderful things that are happening here in our schools. Even though open enrollment is required by law (Minnesota state statute 124D.03), we embrace our open enrollment students as our own students once they join the St. Anthony-New Brighton School District family. If it were not for our open-enrolled students, we would not be able to provide students with the nationally recognized curriculum that we currently offer. Did you know that open enrollment students generate almost \$3 million dollars annually toward our K-12 budget in addition to the funding provided by our resident students?

I will conclude with some great news for our community. Proactive changes including the implementation of Science, Technology, Engineering, Math (STEM) curriculum in kindergarten and the addition of all day kindergarten, combined with more available and affordable homes, have all contributed to an increase in our resident students and families in kindergarten classrooms this fall. Our 2009-2010 kindergarten class consists of 75% resident students, the highest percentage of resident students in kindergarten since open enrollment began. We celebrate the fact that we are being selected as the District of choice for families with small children at a much higher rate than ever before!

St. Anthony Middle School is one of nine schools in the state to be authorized as an IB Middle Years Programme. After an extensive application process and onsite visit, Shirley Gregoire, principal, was notified in July that St. Anthony Middle School was authorized as an International Baccalaureate (IB) World School. St. Anthony Middle School staff assembled for a full day of training on August 28 and were greeted by Marlys Peters-Melius, Executive Director of the Minnesota Association of IB Schools, who remarked, "Congratulations to all of you. It's exciting to receive this honor. You have chosen one of the best, most highly effective education programs I have seen." IB focuses on continuous improvement through teacher training, curriculum development, student assessment and school evaluation.

While the mission of IB is to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people, the Middle Years Programme is specifically designed to help students develop the knowledge, understanding, attitudes and skills necessary to participate actively and responsibly in a changing world.

Middle School Implements Science, Technology, Engineering, Math Curriculum

In September, St. Anthony Middle School implemented Project Lead the Way – Gateway to Technology® (PTLW) curriculum that will bridge our elementary and high school science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) programs. Students in grades six, seven and eight will develop stronger skills in the areas of math, science, and technology inquiry as they apply engineering skills to solve everyday problems. The activity-oriented curriculum begins in 6th grade where students participate in a science unit focused on flight and space. Students in 7th and 8th grade concentrate on engineering skills through units of design and modeling and the science of technology.

Weaving Character Education into Co-Curricular Activities

This year, advisors and coaches of middle and high school activities and athletics are implementing a character development program developed by the Josephson Institute of Ethics (charactercounts.org). The program 'Pursuing Victory with Honor' aims to promote sportsmanship and foster good character in athletics and activities by teaching, enforcing, advocating and modeling the Six Pillars of Character: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and good citizenship. Staff attended a two-day training in August, hosted by the Josephson Institute, to learn about character development in youth activities and athletics and build a program for our district. All too often winning becomes the main focus of an extracurricular program, when victory should actually be a by-product of a program that fosters character development. Each week, advisors and coaches will teach a 'True Champions Practice Point' lesson to foster discussion among participants about the components of good character. In addition, each extracurricular activity and athletic group will complete a service project during the year.

While Yamini connects her experience at St. Anthony Village High School to her post-

secondary success, she specifically credits the rigorous classes and high expectations of staff. Yamini commented, “The teachers at SAVHS . . . challenged me above and beyond the norm to help me get where I wanted to be. The one-on-one attention and investment of the teachers at SAVHS helped me gain confidence in myself to reach my goals.”

Yamini was selected as the student commencement speaker at her 2007 graduation from Wellesley College where she spoke alongside Madeline Albright. “There’s no way I would have been able to stand before over 1,500 people on Wellesley’s commencement day without the rigorous training I received at St. Anthony,” citing her participation on the speech team beginning in sixth grade.

During her college years, Yamini was selected for a collaborative internship in New York City with Sesame Workshop which focused on nonprofit marketing initiatives and international support of early childhood education. After graduating from Wellesley, Yamini worked at Target Corporate headquarters on the promotional pricing team for two years before transitioning to Harvard Business School.

SANBE Supports Wilshire STEM Program

With SANBE’s help, first-grade teachers at Wilshire Park are implementing new curriculum that focuses on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM).

First-grade engineers? If you haven’t considered the possibility, then check out what first-grade teachers are getting their students to build: pinwheels, spinning tops, beaver lodges, see-saws, towers, bridges, and walls. By using recyclable materials brought from home and LEGOs, students learn about energy, balance, force, pressure, buoyancy, and many other physical properties.

The new STEM curriculum is also teaching students how to utilize their talents on the computer and, with the help of digital media, to record, edit, and present their findings. One class will use digital camcorders and editing software to create a presentation on the life cycle of butterflies that students will be growing in their own room.

The new STEM curriculum is intended to promote scientific literacy and make our students proficient in describing and explaining what they know. This project is a real demonstration of how District 282 teachers hope to contribute to American scientific achievement.
